The regular meeting of the Monroe City Council was called to order by Mayor Parsons at 7:00 7 8 p.m. 9 2. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mayor Parsons. Monroe City Council Minutes 8 26 2025  Consider recommendation amending Monroe City Land Use Ordinance
 (a). Family Food or Recreational Production - Limiting number of pigs allowed per parcel of land.

Planning Commissioner Chair Candice Barney thanked those Councilmembers that attended their special meeting held August 5, 2025, to discuss the Family Food or Recreational Production and the Wellhead Zone general requirements.

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The Planning Commission held a public hearing during their August 19, 2025, regular Planning Commission to receive comments concerning amendments to these two sections of the Monroe City Land Use ordinance.

Chair Barney explained that the Planning Commission is recommending that the Family Food or Recreation Productions be amended to only allow two (2) pigs/hogs, three (3) months or older per parcel of land.

The Council discussed the wording for the amendment and agreed to the terms limiting the number of pigs/hogs but felt the wording of the policy was unclear and could cause confusion for our property owners and City staff. The Council would like the section referring to the limit of how many pigs/hogs a property owner may have on their property to be clearly stated at the end of the document. This will be easier for everyone to understand that a property owner may only have two pigs/hogs three months or older. Five thousand (5,000) sq. feet allowance applies and is required for pigs/hogs.

## (b). Amendment to development in Wellhead Protection Zone

Chair Barney explained that the Planning Commission is recommending an amendment to the Wellhead Protection Zone ordinance to allow limited development in this zone. The amendment states the following:

\*Zone One no development

 \*Zone Two development allowed with no culinary water connection nor septic system. All buildings must be constructed on a concrete foundation designed to prevent subsurface infiltration of potential contaminants, and no storage or handling of

hazardous material.

\*Zone Three development but no new septic system is allowed.

\*Zone Four – Traditional septic system is allowed but must have a minimum lot size of 73 74 two-acres. 75 76 Council will take action on the Planning Commission recommendation during business item (d). 77 2. Consider Conditional Use Business License - Tamara Parsons 78 79 Chair Barney explained to the Council that Tamara Parsons submitted a business license 80 application for a home occupation business. This business includes holding sport activities, 81 82 practice, instruction camps, and family functions. It was determined this was a permitted use and the license was issued. 83 84 Tonight Ms. Parsons is here to request permission to allow Ashlyn Thalman to hold dance 85 lessons in the gym until she can build a dance studio of her own. Ms. Thalman has been in the 86 process for some time to secure a place for her dance studio, however things have not moved 87 along as quickly as she had hoped. 88 89 Ms. Parsons stated to the Council that she understands there are rules in place to protect 90 residential zones, but 97% of Ms. Thalman's students live in Monroe, which shows this studio is 91 beneficial to our residents. Ms. Parsons explained that she has told Ms. Thalman that she would 92 93 only be able to use her gym as a dance studio on a temporary basis, and she would only be able to use the gym until April 2026. 94 95 Chair Barney explained that the Planning Commission recognizes the benefits of a dance studio 96 in Monroe, however the ordinance does not allow for this type of business in a residential zone. 97 Home occupations are only allowed for those residing in the home and Ms. Thalman does not 98 live with Ms. Parsons. The dance studio would also bring a lot of traffic to 400 S, which is a 99 dead-end street. Because of these reasons the Planning Commission does not recommend a 100 conditional use business license be approved for Ms. Thalman's dance studio. 101 102 The Council discussed that they understand Ms. Thalman has been working for nearly a year to 103 obtain a piece of property to build a dance studio and is close to finalizing the purchase, but this 104 does not change the fact that we need to follow our ordinances. 105 106 It was suggested to Ms. Thalman that she consider renting the City's Community Center to hold 107 dance classes until she can find a more suitable place. Ms. Thalman stated she would look into 108 109 this as a temporary solution.

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153	Mayor Parsons explained that in visiting with Travis Kyhl with R6 Council he recommended that if the Senior Citizens Center was going to be rented to the public that the project should be
154 155	named the Monroe City Community Building not South Sevier Senior Citizens Center. Changing
156	the name to reflect what the use would be will help with funding opportunities. Mr. Kyhl also
157	recommended that we downsize the building to a point where the cost would be between \$2
158	million and \$ 2.5 million.
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160	Councilmember Mathie stated that if we have to cut down the building to the point that it will
161	not meet the community and senior citizens nutrition program needs, maybe we should wait a
162	few years until we have the funds to meet the needs.
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164	Councilmember Cartwright explained that the nutrition program is more than just meals for the
165	seniors. It's a way to get the seniors out of their house and to socialize, which helps with their
166	mental health.
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168	The Council discussed many different options, and it was decided to have a special Council
169	meeting with Sunrise Engineering to work on plans for the community building with changes
170	discussed tonight.
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172	The Council determined that a special Council meeting be noticed for September 9, 2025, at
173	6:00 p.m.
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175	Councilmember Cartwright moved to change South Sevier Senior Citizen Building project to
176 177	Monroe City Community Center Building project. Councilmember Sirrine seconded the motion. A roll call vote was called. Voting yes: Councilmembers Cartwright, Mathie, Payne, and
177 178	Sirrine. The vote was unanimous. The motion carried. 4-0

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190 \*With the rainstorm we had on August 16, 2025, our cold spring water production has dropped dramatically. Parker Vercimak with Jones and DeMille Engineering has been contacted and he 191 will work with the City to see what can be done. 192 193 194 Mayor Parsons explained that the water that was coming off the mountain during the rainstorm 195 was very thick black mud. 196 The employees are being proactive and clearing areas around the power hydro's and we are 197 working with funding agencies for funds to help mitigate flooding from the Monroe Canyon Fire. 198 199 \*Councilmember Mathie asked about the house flooding on 420 E during the rainstorm Monroe 200 experienced on August 24, 2025. Mayor Parsons stated that he had also been up to the home 201 that was flooded, and it was discussed that this home does sit lower than other homes in the 202 203 area. 204 205 This storm brought an extraordinary amount of water to this area. Power Foreman Josey Parsons was on call and the new water inlets into the canal were all plugging and needed 206 207 clearing during the storm. 208 Councilmember Mathie asked about the enforcement of property owners filling their driveways 209 with gravel or asphalt, which affects the drainage. It was discussed that it is against the City's 210 policy to do this, and we need to be more proactive in enforcement. It was suggested that we 211 put a reminder in a City newsletter about the policy of placing gravel in the right-of-way and 212 might ask the local companies that sell gravel to Monroe City property owners to tell the 213 214 owners that they should contact the City before spreading the gravel. 215 b. Department Business-Council 216 217 218 Councilmember Payne – 219 \*Attended the UAMPS annual conference at Lake Tahoe. It was very informative, and Mayor 220 Parsons did very well with his presentation on our public involvement with our public power 221 picnic. Some Mayors told Mayor Parsons and Councilmember Payne that they were going to 222 start holding their public power picnics again because of Mayor Parsons presentation. 223 224 225 Councilmember Mathie -226 Monroe City Council

236	from the federal government for a lot of different items needed. One project that should come
237	soon is water gauges placed in the creek to warn of water rising and weather stations placed on
238	the mountain to give us as much information as possible and as soon as possible.
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240	*Sevier County sent a trackhoe over to assist in clearing some log jams in the Monroe Creek.
241	After seeing the situation concerning the log jams Mayor Parsons has asked Public Works
242	Director John Draper to start looking for a used trackhoe for the City to purchase. We would like
243	to get one that is used, and in good enough shape that in a few years we can sell it if needed to
244	recoup the money spent now. Mayor Parsons explained that even though Sevier County and
245	other agencies have been good to help, we need to be self-reliant and, in a position, to take
246	care of our own needs.
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248	*Austin Mitchell, crossing guard, has given her two-week notice, so we will be hiring a new
249	person for this position. Cemetery Foreman Shad Lee has volunteered to cover the crossing
250	guard duties until we can find a qualified applicant.
251	*Unsure if access restrictions to Thompson Basin for the paragliders has been lifted at this time.
252	Onsure if access restrictions to mompson Basin for the paragilities has been inted at this time.
